# Our Mission

LDANR's purpose is to provide resources and support to individuals who are affected by learning disabilities within the Niagara Region. We provide leadership in learning disabilities advocacy, research, education and services.

- LDANR reintroduced in person after school programming to meet the needs of our families as we moved to a virtual on-line learning environment during COVID.

Although the pandemic continues to shape the way our organization operates even three years later, the 2022-2023 year was the first year since 2019 that the LDANR felt a sense of normalcy. We were able to find our stride again and settle back into a routine, which we hope that you were able to do as well.

Over the 2022-2023 year, all of us at the LDANR have been busy behind the scenes taking what we learned over the course of the pandemic and putting it into practice to enhance our organization. For example, we have learned how unpredictable the future can be, even from one day to the next, and how important it is to have back-up plans in the event of major business disruptions. As such, we spent the year creating continuity plans and revising our procedures to reflect new systems and practices put in place.

We sincerely want to thank all of you for your patience as we work to refine our processes to best meet our agency's needs and the needs of our clients, staff and volunteers.

Meanwhile, in the forefront, we evolved and adapted both our existing and new programs to satisfy the needs of the Learning Disability community. We continued to offer our popular reading and math support programs, and increased social support opportunities, such as support groups, in accordance with our strategic goals. 

# Reading Rocks

Grades 1-8

Reading Rocks is an individualized reading intervention program designed by Brock University's Dr. John McNamara. Participants work one-to-one with a trained tutor to enhance their literacy skills such as phonics principles, sight word knowledge, and reading fluency.

Between April 2022 to March 2023, LDANR offered a total of 180 Reading Rocks program spots thanks to United Way Niagara, with support from the Ontario Power Generation, Kiwanis St. Catharines, Staples, and the District School Board of Niagara. 40 of these spots were offered in-person, while 140 of the spots were offered online.



**JUMP Math®**  
Grades 1-8



JUMP Math is a curriculum-aligned classroom math program developed by John Mighton, PhD, OC, who founded JUMP Math to give every child the opportunity to successfully learn and enjoy math and achieve their full potential. JUMP Math also offers an excellent structured intervention program, which the LDANR uses to deliver an individualized tutoring program for students with a math-specific learning disability.

Between April 2022 to March 2023, LDANR offered a total of 40 JUMP Math program spots thanks to United Way Niagara. 20 of these spots were offered in-person, while 20 of the spots were offered online.

# Programs & Services

# S.L.A.M. Camp

Ages 9-11

S.L.A.M. (Sunshine, Learning, Achievement & More) Camp is LDANR's full-day summer literacy camp. Participants spend half of the camp day engaged in fun literacy activities, and the other half on recreation and social skill activities.

In Summer 2022, LDANR offered a total of 240 S.L.A.M. Camp program spots thanks to The Branscombe Family Foundation, with support from The Niagara Community Foundation and The Government of Canada.



"I just wanted to take a moment to share with you what an amazing experience [my son] has had at camp. I have to tell you that camps have not always been such a positive experience and leading up to the first day I was very anxious. [My son] was excited and seemed to forget past trials and started with a great attitude. When he reported back he had such a great time the first few days I hate to admit it, but we thought oh it's the honeymoon days, and I was waiting for the other shoe to drop. Guess what?? It never did. [My son] found somewhere so inclusive and understanding of him. As a mother, there isn't anything more I could ask for. Thank you, his time at SLAM has been so meaningful and positive more than we could ever ask for."

## Youth-to-Youth (Y2Y)

Ages 13-18

The Youth-to-Youth (Y2Y) program aims to support youth by creating a space where they can explore issues of concern together. The monthly sessions create a safe and inclusive environment for youth with learning disabilities to meet and share their struggles and strategies for success.

The 2022-2023 academic year was the second year that the Y2Y program took place. The program, which is supported by The Humeniuk Foundation, was offered virtually, and served 7 students between the ages of 13-18. As a result of low Y2Y program enrolment, and in response to feedback received from parents/guardians, in Fall 2023 the LDANR will instead be offering an in-person student social group.

# Programs & Services

# B.E.S.T.

## Grades 3-5

Better Emotional & Social Times ("B.E.S.T.") is a small-group, self-advocacy and coping skills program for children in grades 3-5 who are experiencing secondary characteristics associated with learning difficulties (i.e., low self-esteem, poor social and/or emotional regulation).

Between April 2022 to March 2023, LDANR offered a total of 30 B.E.S.T. program spots thanks to United Way Niagara. 20 of these spots were offered in-person, while 10 of the spots were offered online.

## Webinar Series

### Grades 1-8

Over the 2022-2023 academic year, the LDANR offered a webinar series that included webinars on topics such as Mental Health & LDs and Executive Functioning. In total during the 2022-2023 year, we received 115 webinar registrations, averaging about 14 per webinar.

Compared to the 2021-2022 year, we noticed a decline in webinar registrations, perhaps in part by the return to in-person activities and busy schedules. In Fall 2023, the LDANR will instead be offering an in-person parent social group based on feedback received from parents/guardians.

# Programs & Services

# Transition Programming

During the 2022-2023 academic year, the LDANR was fortunate enough to receive a Resilient Communities grant from the Ontario Trillium Foundation (OTF) to support our two transition programs, namely our SOAR to Secondary ("SOAR") and TIPS for Post-Secondary ("TIPS") programs which focus on supporting students through vulnerable transition periods in an effort to set them up for success.



Between April 2020 and December 2022, LDANR spent time developing and refining the curriculum for the TIPS program, thanks to funding from The Rotary Club of St. Catharines with support from The Learning Disabilities Association of Ontario. LDANR piloted the program, previously titled "SOAR Post-Secondary", as an after-school program during the 2020-2021 and 2021-2022 years, however participation was low. During the 2022-2023 year, thanks to OTF funding, LDANR partnered with the Niagara Catholic District School Board and the District School Board of Niagara to pilot the new TIPS curriculum as a full-day workshop, offered during the school day. During April and May 2023, we were able to offer 30 TIPS program spots.

Also as a result of the OTF funding, LDANR offered 20 SOAR program spots during the 2022-2023 fiscal year, with an additional 10 SOAR spots offered during the 2023-2024 year. In addition, in Spring 2022, LDANR partnered with Niagara Catholic District School Board to offer the SOAR program to 50 students.

"She understands more about herself and her own IEP. It helps to arm us all with knowledge and the support helps us emotionally feel more connected to a community that understands our family and our family's needs better than many others. Without the support of the LDANR, we would be floundering and feel more isolated and less prepared for moving forward on our learning journey."

## CHAMPS

CHAMPS is an after-school drop-in program that runs in partnership with United Way Niagara and The RAFT. CHAMPS specifically runs as an instructional component to United Way's After School Matters program, and intends to provide homework assistance and an extra learning experience for the children.

During the 2022-2023 year, CHAMPS was offered at three St. Catharines locations - Rykert, Manchester and Grantham.
